## USCG SVC Program - Quick Reference Sheet

#### Who?

USCG active duty members, reservists,\* retirees, dependents, and civilian employees may request an SVC.
\*In most cases.

#### When?

As soon as a report of a sex-related offense is made - Restricted OR Unrestricted - or any time after it is made.

#### What?

SVCs are attorneys that provide advice, advocacy, and empowerment for victims, making their voices heard through the investigation and legal process.

#### How?

Contact a SARC, VA, FAS (for dependents), or SVC directly (see information below).



## **An Overview**

Special Victims' Counsel (SVC) are CG attorneys that represent victims of sex-related offenses. Victims have been granted specific rights by law; the SVC ensures these rights are not violated.

SVC do not work for the command; *they work for the victim*. All communications between an SVC and the victim are privileged.

SVC advise victims on their options and communicate on their behalf with commanders, supervisors, medical providers, CGIS and legal personnel.



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## Victims' Rights

- To be reasonably protected from the accused.
- To receive reasonable, accurate, and timely notice of specific legal proceedings.
- To attend any public proceeding.
- To be reasonably heard at specific legal proceedings.
- To confer with the government concerning legal proceedings.
- To receive restitution as provided in law.
- To proceedings free from unreasonable delay.
- To be treated with fairness and respect for dignity and privacy.

### Additional Information on Services

SVCs also assist victims with the following:

- Maintaining <u>privacy</u> with regards to information, such as mental health records or past sexual conduct.
- Coordinating access to resources that maintain confidentiality, including a SARC, VA, FAS, medical provider, or Chaplain.
- Requesting expedited transfers, waiver of weight policies, sick leave, unrated time, no-fault disenrollment from "A" School, or MPOs.
- Representing the victim at investigatory interviews (including CGIS), and obtaining copies of statements made to investigators.
- Advising victims about misconduct that may have occurred around the time of the sexual offense.
- Representing victims' interests throughout the military justice process and at all proceedings.
