2014 ENLISTED PERSON OF THE YEAR FOR ALASKA

Petty Officer Taylor demonstrated superior professionalism and outstanding performance of duty while serving onboard ALEX HALEY. ET1 Taylor was extremely dedicated to the professional growth and development of his shipmates, assisting with their qualifications, leadership and personal matters. During this past year, he supervised 60 qualified and 20 break-in watchstanders. ET1 Taylor personally led a 10 person team comprised of Base personnel, civilian contractors and ship's force in the overhaul & replacement of the cutter's 2-ton shipboard radar antenna. As an active morale committee member, he was instrumental in the planning and execution of morale events underway and in port. Additionally, ET1 Taylor's dedication was apparent with the exceptional achievement of qualifying as Underway Officer of the Deck, a qualification normally held by officers, chiefs and senior Boatswains Mates. In his continuing pursuit of a Bachelor's Degree, ET1 Taylor earned three college credits during patrol with ALEX HALEY's underway college. He expertly led the Electronics and Communications Divisions to a 98 percent

score during Tailored Ships Training Availability, earning a Battle "E" for the Command and Control warfare area. Through his professionalism, he resolved over 20 electronic line items to achieve zero discrepancies during Boat STAN and was a responsible steward of \$322,000 of funding for electronics systems maintenance and property of electronic equipment. ET1 Taylor was actively committed to public outreach as evidenced through hosting Kodiak Cub Scouts onboard as well as the planning and supervision of "Haunted Haley", which hosted 500 visitors and garnered more than 600 canned food donations. He led crew members in community service/ beach clean-up projects, fund raising efforts for charity auctions and luncheons for students as part of the Partnership in Education program. ET1 Taylor displayed exceptional loyalty to shipmates: always the first person to volunteer his liberty time to mentor shipmates, exchange duty and assist with qualifications. ET1 Taylor has been stationed onboard ALEX HALEY since June 2013. He is a native of Baton Rouge, Louisiana and enlisted in the Coast Guard in 2001.

2014 WINNER OF THE ADMIRAL GRACEY AWARD

This month, we congratulate Petty Officer Noel Cordero, the recent recipient of the 2014 Admiral James S. Gracey Award. The award is presented to the individual within the U.S. Coast Guard Pacific Area who, by performance of duty, best exemplifies the professionalism, devotion to duty and excellence of the U.S. Coast Guard.

The Pacific Area Coast Guard Foundation is honored to commend and award SK3 Noel Cordero, USCGC ALEX HALEY in Kodiak, Alaska. Petty Officer Cordero demonstrated exceptional professionalism and leadership while procuring 500,000 dollars in needed supplies and 500,000 gallons of fuel for the cutter while operating in the Coast Guard's most logistically challenging region. As one of the most experienced Boarding Team Members, her expert knowledge of Alaskan fisheries was essential to the execution of 110 boardings and the detection of 16 violations. This aggressive enforcement posture propelled ALEX HALEY to lead the Pacific

cutter fleet in achievement of boarding goals. During the annual Tailored Ships Training Availability, Petty Officer Cordero led the Medical Training Team, a position normally filled by a senior Health Services Technician, earning a perfect score in all drills and earning the Battle "E" for Medical. On two occasions, Petty Officer Cordero used her Suicide Intervention skills and Victim Advocate training to compassionately respond to shipmates with suicidal ideations, disabling their plans and remaining with the members until medical care arrived. She led numerous community outreach and service projects across Alaska including work with Kodiak High School and the Partnership in Education Program, and a renewal project at the Kodiak Humane Society. During ALEX HALEY's holiday visit to Akutan, she brought donated clothing, blankets and gifts to the village. Through her excellence and professionalism, Petty Officer Cordero truly exemplified the highest traditions of the U.S. Coast Guard.

“For exceptionally meritorious service from July 2014 to December 2014, while engaged in vital law enforcement and life saving search and rescue operations with national and international impact. In support of multiple missions, included Operations BERING SHIELD, MARINE RESOURCE PROTECTOR, and BERING SAFEGUARD ALEX HALEY conducted nine search and rescue cases, saved six lives and led the Pacific Area cutter fleet with 140 boardings that resulted in 37 fisheries and safety violations. Their detection and case package documentation of five foreign vessel incursions along the United States-Russia Maritime Boundary Line resulted in enforcement action by the Russian government and safeguarded the rich Bering Sea fish stocks of our Exclusive Economic Zone. Additionally, ALEX HALEY exhibited exemplary diplomacy while leading the high



A FINAL, BULLDOG WORD FROM CAPTAIN

As I finish my last patrol on the Mighty Bulldog, I'm flooded with memories. Some of those memories are the rough conditions we braved. Others revolve around the long periods we spent at sea away from friends and family.
