

With a splash of North Pacific seawater, the officers and crew came together to honor CGC ALEX HALEY's newly minted permanent Cuttermen.

LTJG Hill, FS2 Condulle, EM1 Campbell, SK1 Mitchell, MK1 Brown, and EM2 Fadeley formally requested recognition as permanent Cuttermen. In many respects, the oral board is intended to recognize the camaraderie of their efforts. Each shipmate responded to a spectrum of questions: spanning the Revenue Cutter Service to ALEX HALEY's own history and missions. When these questions might have proven too challenging, each had the choice for song. There is nothing better than a lively rendition of Semper Paratus to show our pride.

For these 6 crew members, this represents their commitment to excellence. Each has devoted a major portion of their career to serving afloat. On this list we have career cooks, electricians, mechanics, and a deck watch officer. They each spent a tour learning the skills and adaptability to succeed. Then they asked to do it again! For many, this is their second or third ship. With each assignment, their level of responsibility and impact to the unit and crew grew. They are leaders.

Each crew member can now add the Cutterman pin to their uniforms. The design is a combination of three basic parts. Each is representative of a Cutterman's special qualities. The wheel and the waves represent the heritage of the sea. The five point star represents five years of sea duty and the center, the shield, represents the Coast Guard and its seagoing tradition.

The ceremony itself was also an opportunity to welcome these new permanent Cutterman and inspire the next generation of sailors. The CO acknowledged our living tradition and paused reflecting on the grand sum of more than 177 combined years of sea time. They're instrumental in coordinating mail deliveries to the cutter, facilitating the delivery of letters and care packages. The Ombudsman duo also keep families informed of ALEX HALEY's schedule including changes in times and dates of return to home port. This year CDR Denning wanted to specially recognize Emily and Wendy in front of the crew. During a small ceremony, CDR Denning told the crew about the special role of the Ombudsman in the Coast Guard and Cutter community.
